MAY SPEAKER

Frank Weissbarth on New Mexico



We moved from the Philadelphia area to New Mexico in 1985 and moved to northern Virginia a few months ago to be near our children and grandchildren. I was involved in the creation of the first TU chapter in New Mexico circa 1990 and served as NLC rep from 2011 to 2014. I worked for 20 years in the New Mexico Attorney General's Office where, among many other things, I represented the Game and Fish Department in a series of hearings concerning the use of piscicides to restore native Rio Grande cutthroat and Gila Trout. After leaving the AG's office I served as General Counsel for a large state agency and then was in private practice for 10 years until retiring in 2020.

The Rio Grande begins as a series of tiny brooks high along the east slope of the continental divide, across the 12,000 ft. Stony Pass from Silverton, Colorado. Once a myriad of tributaries, large and small, joined the great river and it flowed unbroken to the sea. No more. Today, the Rio and its tributaries are used and abused. Most of the streams that once added to the river's flow sucked dry for irrigation before they ever reach the river. Once the river was filled with Rio Grande cutthroats and a host of other native fish. Those fish are gone. Today Rio Grande cutthroats are found are found only in high country tributaries, most in streams so small that it's hard to believe that trout reside in them.



Despite the abuse, the Rio Grande remains a sometimes great but always mystifying fishery. It is a trout stream from its headwaters down to the village of Velarde, about 30 miles north of Santa Fe. For nearly 40 years this was my home water, and I've fished it from its headwaters down to where it becomes a warm water fishery, but the part of the river I love best is the Rio Grande Gorge, which runs roughly from the Colorado Border to the Orilla Verde Recreation Area at the southern end of the Rio Grande del Norte National Monument, a national monument TU helped create. This evening I want to take you on a trip down into the Gorge with me, albeit one a lot less strenuous than the real thing and give a few free tips for fishing the river that may come in handy if you ever have a chance to fish it.

Mike Abramowitz on Fly Fishing Safely


Mike is a retired anesthesiologist who has an interest in all types of safety issues. The presentation will focus on fly fishing safety, both on and off the stream, including traveling to far away destinations. Topics presented will include weather concerns, wading in streams, hook injuries, health issues, including hypothermia and altitude sickness. Planning local and distant travel helps you get home safely to fish another day. Mike finds fly fishing to be a challenging and exciting sport. When not fishing, he spends time volunteering with Project Healing Waters at the DC Veterans Hospital. He has assisted his wife's volunteer work with Casting for Recovery. Mike has written a number of articles that were published in the "Mid Atlantic Fly Fishing Guide". He is an active fly tier, fly designer, and fly rod builder. He loves spending time outdoors (even when not fishing

May: Foam Beetle Plus



Time to tie flies to get ready for summer and fall fishing.

Originator: A.K. Best

One of my favorite flies for late summer and fall, and a sure winner for brookies in the Shenandoah National Park streams. It is also a hit with pan fish and smallmouth bass. This is a combination of several recipes, is quick and easy to tie, and adds a wing tip sticking out from under the back shell of a struggling beetle; recommended in an article by A.K. Best.

Techniques to be learned:

* Attaching white Z-Lon wing tip

June: Foam Ants



This is a sure winner for Brookies in the Shenandoah Mountains and catches sunfish and other fish in lakes and streams as ants are an abundant food source just about everywhere. Also to be discussed are several ant patterns that you can try.

Originator:

Unknown for most patterns but I first saw the cork plug/yellow calf tail ant tied by Harry Murray from Edinburg, VA.

Techniques to be learned:

* Firmly attaching the thread base

- * Preparing peacock herl snapping off weak tips before tying in
- * Twisting and wrapping peacock herl body with thread reinforcement
- * Using moose hair for legs (stubs left over from making moose hair tails on the Mr. Rapidan fly), can also use a variety of natural and synthetic materials but I like the stiffness of the moose hair
- * Cutting, attaching, stretching and tying down a foam wing case back
- * Attaching various colored visibility indicator to top/back of fly
- * Finish with two half hitches

Recipe:

Hook: Standard Dry Hook, TMC 100 # 12, 14, 16 Thread: Black 6/0 Wing Tip: White Z-Lon or yarn Body: Peacock Herl - 4 strands Legs: Moose or deer hair, pheasant tail fibers or black rubber legs Wing Case: ¹/4 inch strip of Black foam (width the gap of the hook) Visibility Indicator: Yellow Calf's Tail or synthetic material of any color that helps you see the fly under various lighting and water flow conditions

Tying Tips:

- * Lay down tight wraps of thread from the head to the hook bend
- * Extend white Z-Lon from attachment point at the bend of the hook to the back of the hook bend, do not extend beyond this point
- * To help "bullet proof" the peacock herls loosely wrap the bundle of hurl with three or four wraps of thread and then pull the wrapped hurl over the top of the hook and work forward to just one eye width of the eye, tie off and cut off excess (save herl if it is long enough to tie another fly)
- * Carefully stretch the foam back forward, which will cause the foam to wrap around the sides of the body, make a few wraps to prevent the foam from snapping back then proceed to tie in the wing (indicator).
- * Use several different colors for the indicator to use in various lighting conditions. Some like to tie in a little Krystal Flash to make it more visible.
- * Google search "Tying the foam beetle fly" to see various patterns and flying techniques.

Fishing Tip:

This terrestrial fly is best fished in summer and fall. Apply your favorite floatant; dead float once through a likely lie and then dead float with occasional twitching.

- * Tying in wings
- * Tying in various bodies
- * Tying in and wrapping hackle

Recipe:

Hook: Dry Fly Hook, TMC 100 # 12 or 14 Thread: black 6/0

Wing: Optional White Z-Lon, any color yarn, hackle tips, pink craft fur or Yellow Calf's Tail

Body: Rainy Ant Foam, 3/8" strip of black, brown or red foam, dubbing, or painted cork plugs (drink a bottle of good wine and save the cork)

Legs: black, grizzly or brown hackle

Tying Tips:

* Tie in the short base of thread about ½ way between the eye and the start of the bend of the hook. "Wrap the thread very tightly to prevent the wings from twisting around the hook shaft". I once had the cork body ant twist around such that the back half of the body mostly filled the gap of the hook. I kept getting strikes but no hook-ups?

Some people use a small file to roughen up the spot where you apply the thread and then coat it with head cement.

- * The wing is really and indicator for you to see the small fly on the water. Use different colors for the weather and lighting conditions. Some put a little crystal flash in with the wing material, make the fly more visible.
- * When using craft fur or other synthetic material for the wing tie it in a little long so that it is easy to grab when wrapping two to four twists of hackle behind and in front of the wing. Then trim the wing just a little longer than the hackle.
- * You can also tie in the hackle parachute style. Just make several wraps around the wing to make a post to wrap the hackle (four wraps). Wrap thread in front of and behind the post so that it stands vertical.

Fishing Tip:

Dead float once then dead float with occasional twitching, best fished in summer and fall. Large cork body fly with a yellow calf tail wing can be used as an indicator for a small nymph.

FISH WITH A MEMBER

May

Piney Branch - Virginia When: May 7 Depart: 8 a.m. Return: Whenever Meet: Starbucks in Fair Lakes Shopping Center (map)

Depending on the weather, we will go either the top or the bottom of the Piney.

The only license you need is a current Virginia license. The terrain can be steep at times, so pack light and bring water to keep you hydrated. Hip boots will be all you need to fish this stream.

Small parachute Adams and Olive Elk Hair Caddis work well even when fish aren't rising. Working upstream with short casts and keeping the slack out of your line works best. Another fly that works well is the green weenie, which imitates caddis larvae that are common in Park streams. Carry flies in several different sizes. A final tip to avoid getting lost on the return: stay on the <u>Piney</u> <u>Branch Trail</u>, and don't turn onto the Piney Ridge Trail. Remember that fish live in "branches" but not on ridges!

Rapidan River - Virginia When: Friday, May 13 Depart: 8 a.m. Return: Whenever Meet: Starbucks in Fair Lakes Shopping Center (map)

This is a Friday trip.

Make sure you have a current Virginia license, and remember this is a catch and release only stream. Spring is officially here so there should be plenty of bug life.

You should find a variety of bug hatches. You can always do well with a size 12 Quill Gordon, or a size 14 or 16 Mr. Rapidan, Blue Quill, or Royal Wulff. Even, if nothing is rising, brookies will often hit a dry fly. If you nymph, a size 14 or 16 Hare's Ear, flash -back Pheasant Tail, and Prince nymphs, fished deep and allowed to tumble along the bottom, or a soft hackle fished on a swing will usually take fish.

Bring some water along because you will be doing quite a bit of hiking. Short rods, 5x or 6x tippets, and hip boots will be all you need to fish this stream. The terrain can be steep at times, so I suggest packing light and bringing some water to keep you hydrated. A backpack can slow you down, so if you can fit lunch and water in your vest or on your belt you'll be able to wade and fish more efficiently.

JUNE

Rapidan-Staunton Rivers- Virginia When: June 4 Depart: 8:00 a.m. Return: Whenever Meet: Starbucks at Fair Lakes Shopping Center (map)

We will fish the Rapidan/Staunton near Graves Mill near where the Rapidan leaves the Park.

Make sure you have a current Virginia license, and remember this is a catch and release only stream.


I like Mr. Rapidans, Quill Gordons, Olive Caddis and the Orvis Look-Up ant. If you nymph, a size 14 or 16 Hare's Ear, flashback Pheasant Tail, and Prince nymphs, fished deep and allowed to tumble along the bottom, or a soft hackle fished on a swing will usually take fish.

Short rods, 5x or 6x tippets, and hip boots will be all you need to fish this stream. The terrain can be steep at times, so I suggest packing light and bringing some water to keep you hydrated. A backpack can slow you down, so if you can fit lunch and water in your vest or on your belt, you'll be able to wade and fish more efficiently
